## Lions Clubs International Research Programs

The American Diabetes Association will administer the 1988-89 Lions Club International Foundation Clinical Research Program in Diabetic Eye Disease. This program funds research grants in the United States and throughout the world. Grants are restricted to research related to diabetic retinopathy and may be in the form of Research and Development Awards, Feasibility Grants, or Fellowships.

The Research and Development Award is designed to assist young investigators make the transition to becoming independent investigators. The award supports such individual's salary and

parch program for two years to enable the investigators to initiate independent research efforts that would result in sufficient accomplishments to qualify for future long-term research funding.

The purpose of the International Feasibility Grant is to assist investigators who want to test the feasibility of new and innovative diabetic retinopathy-related ideas in order to obtain preliminary data upon which a subsequent research grant application could be based and submitted to other funding agencies. The program is intended for investigators with or without prior significant support. for established investigators in the field of diabetes who are proposing projects which constitute a new and exciting line of research, and for established investigators in other fields who are proposing projects in which they will transfer their special expertise to retinopathy-related

The Lions Clubs International Fellowship Program is designed to support the training of physicians toward a career in the investigative and clinical aspect of diabetic retinopathy and to encourage Ph.D scientists, to undertake basic research in the area of diabetic retinopathy.

## Wearing Medical Identification is Individual's Responsibility -- And a Necessity

Recently, we received a call in the affiliate office from the mother of a young woman who has insulin dependent diabetes. The daughter had experienced a hypoglycemic reaction while driving and had been stopped by the police. She informed the officer she was having an insulin reaction and needed assistance. The officer, however, disregarded her claim because she did not have any identification on her that supported her statement, she was given a ticket, and the officer left. Her mother was understandably upset when she called the office to see if we had any brochures or information regarding the signs and symptoms of insulin reaction which could be given to the police department. After learning that the association has a slide presentation on diabetic emergencies and brochures for fire and police personnel, she informed the police department. An officer dropped by the office to view the slide presentation and to talk about what could be done in the future to avoid a similar incident. In the course of our

conversation, some very important observations were made that we feel need to be passed along to our readers.

The symptoms of insulin reaction do often resemble those of alcohol intoxication or drug usage. While police personnel are instructed on the signs and symptoms of insulin reactions, they are also taught to look for a medical bracelet or necklace to differentiate between a reaction and alcohol or drug abuse. The officer also stated that there have been cases in which people have falsely claimed to be diabetic and experiencing an insulin reaction to avoid arrest.

It would seem that there are some steps we can take now to hopefully address this problem. We need to educate as extensively as possible law enforcement personnel about diabetes and the signs and symptoms of hypoglycemia. The slide presentation available from the affiliate office is an excellent means by which to accomplish this. The slides, complete with script, are available on a loan basis to anyone who wishes to present a

program in their community. There are also brochures that are written specifically for fire and police personnel that can be distributed.

Most importantly, we need to recognize that we have a responsibility to wear proper identification that will alert police and emergency personnel of the existence of a medical condition that requires special attention. Bracelets and necklaces are available in most pharmacles, but these offer only limited protection. The nonprofit foundation, Medic Alert, provides a bracelet or necklace with a number that can be called anytime if the wearer is unable to supply information. The services provided by Medic Alert are endorsed by the American Diabetes Association.

- While the Insured is in, on, boarding or alighting from any aircraft in the capacity of pilot or crew member; or any aircraft owned or leased by the Club or an employee of the Club (except on a single trip charter basis); operated by an employee of the Club; not having a current unrestricted air-worthiness certificate; or operated by other than a properly certificated pilot
- Disease or illness other than that which results solely from the accidental ingestion or inhalation of a toxic substance or bacterial infection other than that occurring in consequence of an accidental cut or wound







### Jottings from Jennings

Car International President, Austin Jennings, stresses service in a changing world. The program of International President Jennings highlights cooperation in service. Lions are encouraged to support LCIF, and to provide service that will bring about a drug free future and conquer diabetes.

LCIF is the official funding vehicle for the Association, but it does NOT GIVE GRANTS TO INDIVIDUALS! The Lions Interclub program tends to provide avenues for material assistance, but the request must originate from a Lions club. There are, however, many other requests from individuals

and organizations that Lions might wish to help.

In addition to supporting the on-going programs of the Association, International President Jennings has emphasized the necessity of recognizing the impact which change has had on societies and their needs: "As Lions, we have a particular oponsibility to study the needs of the societies we serve and,

if required, change our ways of meeting them,"



### FOR YOUR INFORMATION

### Sale exemption info.

The new provision (effective Jan. 1, 1989) changes the standards for determining the occasional sale exemption on sales by nonprofit organizations. Under the new standards, sales of tampible personal property and services, including admissions or ticlets to an event, conducted by a nonprofit organization are exempt occasional sales IF: (1) there is no professional entertainment, (2) the organization is not engaged in a trade or business and (3) the organization is not otherwise required to have a seller's permit.

Under the statute an organization is deemed to be engaged in a trade or business it its sales of tangible personal property or services (not including sales of tickets to events), or its events occur on more than 20 days during the year. However, it an organization's receipts do not exceed \$15,000 for the year, it is not considered to be engaged in a trade or business even if its sales and or events exceed 20 days.

A nonprofit organization whose gross receipts have become taxable because it has exceeded the above standards must obtain a seller's permit and pay taxes on all taxable receipts received after it is required to obtain that permit.

II an organization later becomes eligible for the occasional sale exemption except for its po-session of a seller's permit, it may surrender that permit.

Please include in your December Newelletter the fact that the week of January 8 through 14, 1989 has been designated at Lions Club International Foundation Week and that during that week we would like a strong effort made by you and your subdistrict LCIF Chairman to have each district club make a substantial contribution to the Lions Club International Foundation.

I am happy to note that last year Multiple District 27, Wisconsin contributed over \$72,000 to LCIF in the form of either club contributions or MelVin Jones Fellows. There are now 118 Melvin Jones Fellows in our Multiple District.

Please stress to your clubs that like our own Wisconsin Lions Foundation, Lions International is seeking regular annual contributions to the LCIF and which contributions are disbursed each year throughout the world. The suggested amount is \$10 per club member each year, but the important thing to remember is that each club make some contribution each year so that there is 100% participation in the only worldwide project of our Lions International.

It took 25 years for the Wisconsin Lions Foundation to achieve the goal of 100 % participation of all Wisconsin Lions Club in the WLF. ICIF is now in its 21st year and, hopefully, all Wisconsin Lions Clubs will be participation in it by the time it reaches the age of 251 You can make this goal be achieved.

Please also stress to your clubs the fact that contributions to the ICIF are made in two ways, both equally as important. General contributions go into the fund that is disbursed annually as fast as they are received by a committee head by the past international president which receives and passes on applications for funds made through district governors. Last year, two requests from Wisconsin were received and \$70,000 was granted in response to these applications. The second type of contribution received is the \$1,000 amounts toward Melvin Jones Fellows. These contributions go into an endowment fund which hopefully will reach \$20,000,000 when 20,000 Melvin Jones Fellows becomes a reality. As of July 1, 1988, there were in excess of 12,000! Only the interest from this fund is used for disbursements. ICIF would like to see at least one Melvin Jones Fellow in each club.

You and your district ICIF chairman have received information from Lions International on awards available to clubs and districts for the various levels of participation in the general ICIF fund and in naming Melvin Jones Fellows. Let all get to work and make ICIF Week a rousing success by having 100 % participation of your clubs in Lions Clubs International Foundation.

#### NOVEMBER: NATIONAL DIABETES MONTH

Awareness is the message of National Diabetes Month, and the American Diabetes Association wants you to know the warning signs and serious complications of this disease. On behalf of the 237,000 Wisconsin residents with diabetes the American Diabetes Association is working to increase the public's awareness of this serious disease during this time and throughout the year.

Diabetes is a disease in which the body does not produce or respond to insulia, a hormone needed for daily life. The resulting high blood sugar can severely damage the heart, blood vessels, kidneys, eyes and nerves. If left untreated, diabetes can lead to death.

The statistics surrounding diabetes are staggering. Eleven million Americans are believed to have this disease, and 500,000 new cases are reported each year. Of the 11 million, it is estimated that half are unaware that they are victims.

While all people with this disease are potential candidates for complications, the dangerous toll hits those that are unaware of having diabetes. Each year 300,000 people die as a result of diabetes and its complications, and 5,000 people lose their sight. Nearly 25 percent of all new dialysis patients are people with diabetes. About 45 percent of all non-traumatic leg and foot amputations in the U.S. are caused by this disease.

People with diabetes are 2 to 4 times more likely to have heart disease and 2 to 6 times more likely to have a stroke.

Although the tendency for diabetes is present at birth, no one knows exactly what triggers its onset. Because the cause is a mystery, knowing the warning signs could mean the difference between life and death.


The symptoms of Type I. or insulin-dependent, diabetes is characterized by frequent urination accompanied by unusual thirst, extreme hunger, rapid weight loss, weakness.

The onset of fatigue, irritability, nausea and vomiting. Type II. or non-insulin dependent. diabetes is often gradual and undramatic. Symptoms may include those of Type I. blurred vision or change in sight. tingling or numbness in legs, feet or fingers, frequent skin infections, itchy skin, slow healing of cuts and bruises and trowsiness. Type II diabetes to the fredominant type of Fractics. Those individuals at risk for developing diabetes are over the age of 30 over weight, have a history of diabetes within their family and schang to the Native Ameeican, Black on Hispanic have. See your doctor at once if any of these exymptoms are present.

There is no cure for diabetes, but there is hope. The American Diabetes Association supports an annual multi-million dollar research program dedicated to preventing and curing diabetes. The ADA also supports educational programs in an effort to improve the lives of those affected by this disease.

#### BEST RUM CAKE EVER

- 1 Cup butter
- 1 Tsp sugar
- 2 Large eggs
- l Cup dried fruit Baking powder
- l Tsp s∝da Lemon Juice Brown sugar Nuts
- 1-2 quarts Rum

Before you start, sample the rum to check for quality. Good isn't it? Now, go ahead. Select a large mixing bowl, measuring cup, etc. Check the Rum again. It must be just right. To be sure Rum is of the highest quality, pour one level cup of Rum into a glass and drink it as fast as you can. Repeat with an electric mixer beat 1 cup of butter in a large fluffy bowl. Add 1 seaspoon of thugar and beat again. Meanwhile to make sure that the Rum ) of the finest quality try another cup. Open second quart if necessary. Check the Rum again, and go to bed.



During the course of my club visitations, I have found it to be most evident that we are caught up in a Lionistic servitude to our communities. It sponsors Diabetes Research, the leading cause of blindness, our Lions Quest Program that we use in our local school systems was developed from this Foundation using millions of our contributed dollars to do so.

These collars are spent, and are asking not only for renewal but for increase. What we gave last year was probably the same as we gave the year before and the year cefore that. You all know that costs increase and demands do also. Bound together as ONE INTERNATIONAL ORGANIZATION, there is no way we can fail whatever we try, but alone we stand only a slim chance to succeed!

If you already have given to the L.C.I.F. program and you have some monies left, think again what you can do with another gift. While you are at it, the same applies to the w.L.F., they also need our increased support!

January. February, and harch are new membership drive months. Remember when you became a Lion, someone asked you to decime one and you accepted and the club approved you. Was it really that hard for that person to ask you, and was it that hard to accept his offer? Do you believe in what you are doing as a Lion? If the answer is yes to the last question, then take a careful look around you and find someone to share your beliefs in doing humanitarian services. ASK THEM!

A few words about membership since July. Our District has lost 101 members and gained 99, which means that we have lost only two members District-wide in five months. Why do we lose? Over half of the membership we have lost have resigned in good standing. If they resigned in good standing, what discouraged them from continuing in Lionism?

Did anyone care to ask them? We have a need to save those who fall out because they have valuable experience in them that they take from your club.

We have also experienced a loss in membership due to death. We have lost sixteen of our fellow Lions in five months, does this tell us that we are getting old and need to replace ourselves? It should!

There is a bright side to all of this as well! We have gained ten new members who are Lady Lions! In addition, we have seven clubs that they call their home club. My hats off to you clubs who have taken the initiative to not only seek out new members, but to change in a way that is new and even more viable to your communities.

#### Our Symbol of Hope

The three sides of the triangle represent three major goals of the ADA in our efforts to cure and

The base of the triangle represents research. This part of the triangle is broken to indicate the gaps we have today in our knowledge about diabetes and our search for a cure.

The left side of the triangle represents detection. This side also is broken to represent undetected people with diabetes.

The right side of the triangle is unbroken and represents education. Educating the public

about diabetes and its warning signs is critical for finding undiagnosed people who may be at risk for diabetes. Education is also necessary for people who have diabetes, to ensure that they know how to properly manage their disease. This side of the triangle remains unbroken because ADA is the leading voluntary health agency in the field of diabetes, with the most comprehensive public education program.


This triangular design serves as an identification device, and given extensive visibility by our affiliates and chapters, it will be recognized by the American public as representative of the American Diabetes Association, the health agency whose dedication lies in finding a cure for diabetes and helping all those affected by the

disease.



#### Lions Clubs International Research Programs

The American Diabetes Association will administer the 1988-89 Lions Club International Foundation Clinical Research Program in Diabetic Eye Disease. This program funds research grants in the United States and throughout the world. Grants are restricted to research related to diabetic retinopathy and may be in the form of Research and Development Awards, Feasibility Grants, or Fellowships.

The Research and Development Award is designed to assist young investigators make the transition to becoming independent investigators. The award supports such individual's salary and research program for two years to enable the investigators to initiate independent research efforts that would result in sufficient accomplishments to qualify for future long-term research funding.

The purpose of the International Feasibility Grant is to assist investigators who want to test the feasibility of new and innovative diabetic retinopathy-related ideas in order to obtain preliminary data upon which a subsequent research grant application could be based and submitted to other funding agencies. The program is intended for investigators with or without prior significant support, for established investigators in the field of diabetes who are proposing projects which constitute a new and exciting line of research, and for established investigators in other fields who are proposing projects in which they will transfer their special expertise to retinopathy-related research.

The Lions Clubs International Fellowship Program is designed to support the training of physicians toward a career in the investigative and clinical aspect of diabetic retinopathy and to encourage Ph.D scientists, to undertake basic research in the area of diabetic retinopathy.





Peter Cerniglia, Chairman for "Fight For Sight" committee, was the guest speaker. 

#### Amsler Grid Test for macular degeneration



#### Instructions

- Hold the grid 12 to 14 inches from your eyes (comfortable reading distance) or place chart on wall at eye level.
- If you normally wear glasses for reading, do the test with your glasses on. If they are bifocals, look through the bottom or reading portion of the lens.
- Look at the dot in the center of the grid. Now cover your left eye and continue to look at the dot with your right eye. Repeat the test, covering your right eye.
- You should be able to see the four corners of the square and that the large square is made up of many smaller squares.
- 5. If any of the lines disappear or look wavy when you cover either eye, you should see an eye specialist immediately. This could be a warning sign of macular degeneration.

#### BLANKET BOND POLICY

This policy covers all Secretary and/or Treasurers of all Lions, Lioness and Leo Clubs. It also covers all Cabinet Secretary-Treasurers. Policy is for \$25,000 per officer. It automatically will include any new clubs formed during the term of the policy, as it is a blanket policy covering all officially, registered clubs.

As I cannot bill Lioness or Leo Clubs, the entire cost of the policy will be paid by the Lions Clubs.

A special assessment will be added to the first half dues statement.

In 1986 the cost was \$6.50 per club for a three year term.

Note: Phil Meyer of State Farm Insurance was not able to give me a written guarantee of the price of \$2713.00 to remain the same for more than one year, however State Farm's Bond Underwriter assured him that bond premiums remain for long periods of time.

If Council approves the continuance of the blanket bond, you could consider collecting \$9.50 or 10.00 per club, which would eliminate going to the Clubs on an annual basis, and having the funds to pay the premium for two years.

- An atmosphere of fellowship that is maintained by the President and other officers who make sure new, as well as old, members are engaged in it.

- A meeting room that is well lighted, kept at the right temperature, and has a comfortable seating arrangement.
- A Presidential message now, and then, that indeed indicates that this Club is going somewhere.
