BUDGET REPORT WAS PRESENTED AND APPROVED: ALL GUIDELINES ARE BEING SUCCESSFULLY MET EXCEPT MEMBERSHIP ISN'T EXPANDING AS PROJECTED. MOTION WAS MADE BY RC JIM ROBERTS AND 2ND BY KEN ROHDE R223.

FINAL DISTRICT CONVENTION REPORT 1989 WAS GIVEN BY GREG KREFT OF THE MANITOWOC LIONS. \$4600.50 PROFIT WAS REALIZED DURING THE EVENT. MANITOWOC WISHES TO THANK ALL WHO PARTICIPATED AND WOULD BE HAPPY TO HOST IN THE FUTURE.

1990 DISTRICT CONVENTION WILL BE HELD IN GREEN LAKE AT THE HEIDEL HOUSE. GORDON HOFFMAN REPORTED THAT THE EVENT WILL BE HELD NOV. 10-11 PRESERVATIONS ARE NOW BEING HANDLED. STANDARD ROOMS AVAILABLE FOR \$49.00 MINI SUITES \$110.00, 2 BEDROOM SUITES \$129 RESERVATION # 1-800-444-2812 CREDIT CARD CONFORMATIONS ACCEPTED.

1990 STATE CONVENTION IN EAU CLAIRE MAY 17-19 CONVENTION HEADQUARTERS HOLIDAY INN, DISTRICT DONCHEON-MIDWAY MOTOR LODGE. PAST INTERNATIONAL PRESIDENT BRIAN STEVENSON AND HIS WIFE WILL BE THE HONORED GUEST SPEAKER. CONFORMATION ON ALL ROOMS FORTHCOMING.

JOURNEY FOR SIGHT CHAIRMAN IPDG PAUL TADYCH REPORTS THAT GREEN-GLEN CLUB SPONSORED JOURNEY FOR SIGHT PROJECT. INVESTMENT WAS COST OF PRINTING PLEDGE SHEETS. TIME ONLY COMMITMENT \$2700 PROFIT.

ENVIRONMENTAL CHAIRMAN GORDON HOFFMAN ALERTED THE CABINET TO THE HAZARDS OF SLOW DECAYING WASTE IN OUR LANDFILLS. NEWSLETTER WILL CONTAIN INTERESTING FACTS FROM THAT REPORT IN THE FUTURE.

SIGHT CONSERVATION CHAIRMAN ORVIN DODEE PDG HAD NEWS REGARDING THE CONTINUAL SHORT FALL OF DONATED EYES OVER THIS PAST YEAR. 1988 SAW 663 PAIRS OF EYES DONATED. THAT NUMBER FELL TO 537 IN 1989. LION ORV HAS ACCEPTED AN APPOINTMENT BY THE FOUNDATION TO REPRESENT LIONS ON A NEW STATE WIDE ORGAN TISSUE DONATION AWARENESS GROUP.

LICF CHAIRMAN THOMAS KOCH PDG REPORTED THAT INTERNATIONAL HAS ACCEPTED THE SUGGESTION FROM THE LIONS AND MADE THE GOAL OF 75,000 MELVIN JONES THE OBJECTIVE FOR OUR 75TH ANNIVERSARY IN 1992. DONATIONS THIS YEAR ARE SOMEWHAT DOWN. THERE IS A TREND FOR REGIONS AND ZONES TO NAME THEIR OWN MELVIN JONES RECIPIENTS.

LEADER DOG CHAIRMAN GLENN MURTY PDG REPORTED THE DONATIONS FOR LAST YEAR RAN \$5,435.00. SOME CLUBS THAT DIDN'T PARTICIPATE LAST YEAR ARE ALREADY IN FOR THIS FISCAL YEAR.

LIONESS ASSOCIATE AND LIAISON TEAM OF JUNE AND DENNIS KUTCHEN PDG ARE SPONSORING A INFORMATIONAL MEETING MARCH 24, 1990 AT THE FOND DU LAC CLUB IN FOND DU LAC, WI. IN THE PAST ONLY LIONESS WERE INVITED. THIS YEAR THE REGION CHAIRMAN AND ZONE CHAIRMAN ARE ALSO INVITED TO ATTEND TO HELP IN THEIR AWARENESS OF THE LIONESS PROGRAM.

LEADERSHIP AND INDOCTRINATION CHAIRMAN DENNIS KUTCHEN PDG REPORTS THAT THE NEW OFFICER TRAINING WILL BE DONE REGION BY REGION AND WITH A DIFFERENT FORMAT. REGION ONE ALREADY HAD THE PROGRAM AND HAD FAVORABLE FEED BACK. ENCOURAGE NEW MEMBERS TO ATTEND, SPECIAL PROGRAM TO HELP THEIR AWARENESS AND DEVELOPMENT IN LIONISM.

LEO CLUB CHAIRMAN JACK JOHNSON REPORTS THAT A NEW LEO CLUB IS A POSSIBILITY.

LIONS EXTENSION CHAIRMAN GARY WILLIAMS REPORTS THAT POSSIBILITY OF LIONESS CLUB STILL BEING EXPLORED. FORMATION OF THE NEW BREAKFAST CLUB IN THE FOX VALLEY IS GOING FORWARD SLOWLY. EXTENSION MEETING WAS HELD IN PLOVER ON FEB. 24. GARY ATTENDED.

LIONS INFORMATION CHAIRMAN IRV KORTH MENTIONED THAT THE INTERNATIONAL PROVIDES MANY BROCHURES ON A VAST AMOUNT OF SUBJECTS. CHAIRMAN IN THE DISTRICT HAVE DIRECT SUPPLY ON THEIR CHOSEN AREA. DON'T BE AFRAID TO MAKE USE OF THEIR MATERIALS AND EXPERTISE.

MEMBERSHIP DEVELOPMENT AND RETENTION CHAIRMAN DONALD KRINCEL PDG REPORTED ON THE USE OF 3-MAN COMMITTEES TO FOLLOW-UP ON MEMBERS THAT MISS MEETINGS. THE NEW TWIST IS THAT THE CLUB IS DIVIDED INTO 3-MAN COMMITTEES THAT ARE RESPONSIBLE FOR REPORTING BACK TO ANY OF THE MEMBERS OF THEIR TEAM OF 3 THAT MISS A MEETING. Chairman Tom indicated that International has redefined the program for donating money for Melvin Jones Awards on installments. Tom suggests that the clubs who wish to do installments put together yearly installments of \$100 for 5 years, then pay balance to complete the award. Indicate to international that this is for an award to be designated later.

Tom indicated he would like a board appointed to help evaluate Melvin Jones candidates for District Awards.

Leader Dog Chairman Glenn Murty, PDG. 84 of 98 clubs contributed in past Lionistic year. Glenn mentioned that contributions, however, were \$418 down. Hopefully that can be changed this year.

Leadership - PDG Dennis Kitchen mentioned the upcoming train the trainer sessions. Questionnaires have been given to Region and Zone chairman to survey needs in leadership and indoctrination. Chairman Dennis requests a timely return of these surveys so he may plan accordingly.

Lioness Liason PDG Dennis Kitchen. Survey has been sent to Lioness Clubs to access need areas. Prompt return is again appreciated.

Membership Development & Retention - PDG Don Kringel reported that International is proposing that each club have a person appointed in membership area. This individual would also join President and Secretary of each club as a Zone Advisory member.

Wisconsin Lions Foundation - WLF Director Milton O. Wood PDG encourages Zone Chairman to invite WLF Directors to Zone Meeting to show new program on WLF.

Youth Exchange - Chairman Delorean Peterson mentioned need for more host families for Japanese youth (especially boys.) Del stressed need for clubs to recognize funding need for Youth Exchange program. This program has received poorest support of any program within our district.

Tailtwister Dan Lutz levied various fines during the two times he took the floor during the meeting. Fun and fellowship and good natured ribbings were handed out in exchange for fines. Club Membership Chairman Will Be Board Director

Changes in the Standard Form Constitution and Bylaws will strengthen as well as affect the makeup of your club membership. The new resolutions establish a club membership committee, chaired by a newly created club membership director.

The basic elements of the changes include:

1. A club membership committee will be composed of three **elected** members.
2. The committee members shall serve **three-year terms**.
3. The terms shall be on a **rotation system** whereby one new member will be elected each year.
4. The members will serve in the following capacities:
 - a. The first year member as a committee member.
 - b. The second year member as vice chairman of the committee.
 - c. The third year member as the committee chairman and membership director serving as a voting member on the club's board of directors.

The advantages of this new structure are:

- Highlight the importance of the membership responsibility at the club level.
- Encourage regular reporting on membership conditions to the club's board of directors.
- Rotation procedure will better prepare the membership committee chairman and gives continuity to the committee's efforts.

Although these new resolutions do not become official until July 1, 1990, all clubs can begin incorporating them **now**.

Lions Diabetes Education Month

DID YOU KNOW...

- Diabetes is a leading cause of blindness. Diabetics are twenty-five times more prone to blindness.
- Diabetics are seventeen times more prone to kidney disease, five times more prone to gangrene (often leading to amputation) and twice as prone to heart disease and stroke.
- Diabetes decreases life expectancy by approximately one-third.
- The incidence of diabetes appears to be increasing by 6% annually.
- 50% of diabetics don't know they have the disease.
- There are two types of diabetes—insulin dependent and non-insulin dependent.
- Only 10% of the total diabetic population are Type I, insulin dependent.
- Insulin dependent and non-insulin dependent diabetics are subject to the same devastating complications.
- The chances of developing diabetes double with every 20% of excess weight.
- Women are more likely than men to have diabetes.
- The chances of developing diabetes increases during middle and old age.
- Insulin does not cure diabetes. Presently there is no known cure for diabetes.

WHAT CAN YOUR CLUB DO?

- Plan a November Club meeting on diabetes education featuring a speaker from your medical community or diabetic association.
- Offer your Club's assistance to a diabetic association or the medical community in distributing diabetes educational materials to the public.
- Provide diabetes educational releases to newspapers, radio and TV.
- Consider the feasibility of sponsoring a diabetic summer camp or a day camp session.

Lions Clubs International Foundation disburses grant funds in six categories: Standard grants, Emergency grants, Designated grants, Major International Service Program grants, Humanitarian Award grants and Major Catastrophe grants. During the 1988-89 year LCIF approved grants totaling \$4,795,465 compared with \$3,701,795 during the 1987-88 year.

Standard grants included projects for the visually impaired, projects for the hearing impaired, projects for the elderly, projects for children, medical/rehabilitation projects, educational projects and health/social service projects. The Humanitarian Award was for \$200,000 for Dr. Modi Chairtable Eye Trust. The Major Catastrophe Grant for \$100,000 was for eradication of leprosy in Africa. The Major International Service Programs were \$250,000 for international distribution of Don't Be Blind to Diabetes Film, \$200,000 for diabetes research at Japan's Kobe University and \$250,000 for LCIF/Lions Clubs International research program for diabetic retinopathy. 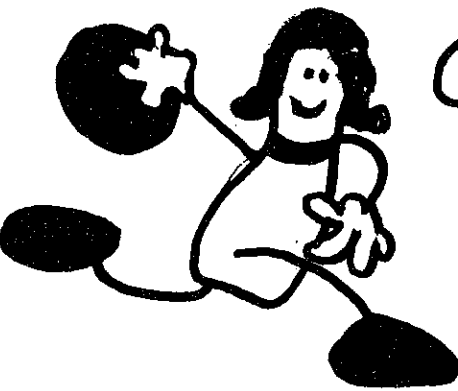

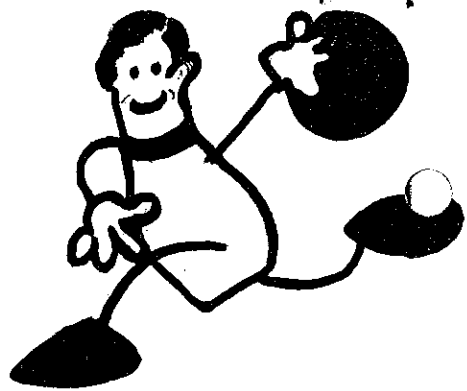

7. Enjoy Lionism through club, zone, district, multiple district and international activities.
8. Work with your club on the major service commitments, such as Drug Awareness and Diabetes Awareness.
9. Participate in community work to aid the blind, the deaf, youth, the poor, the aged and the sick. Participate in community improvements.
10. Enjoy the international flavor of Lionism by attending international conventions. Meet people from 166 countries and geographical locations dedicated to the common cause of service.

WISCONSIN LIONS FIGHT FOR SIGHT

The Wisconsin Lions Fight for Sight project is continuing. The Council of Governors and WLF Directors have decided to continue this project until the goal of \$500,000 is reached. The enclosed report shows that over \$339,000 has been contributed and /or pledged. Clubs who have not contributed or who want to contribute additional funds are encouraged to do so.

FROM YOUR DISTRICT 27-B1 SIGHT CONSERVATION CHAIRMAN:

Sight conservation and work with the blind has been a major project of Lionism since the 1925 International Convention when Helen Keller challenged Lions to become "KNIGHTS OF THE BLIND." There are millions of visually impaired people in the world and our work in this field is desperately needed.

Sight conservation and work with the blind encompasses a broad range of service activities including Diabetes Projects, Eye Banks, Examination and Detection, Leader Dogs for the Blind, Wisconsin Lions Camp and Eye Research. It also includes services to the partially sighted such as new eye glasses for the needy, large print books and magazines, white canes, braille writers, talking books and the collection of used eye glasses; plus a broad range of other services and activities.

Leader Dog Chairman, Glenn Murty can provide information about the Leader Dog program. Diabetes Chairman John Kuester is available for assistance in Diabetes related projects. Wisconsin Lions Foundation Directors Milt Wood and Herb Schneider will help with information and applications for the Wisconsin Lions Camp.

There is a great deal of information and data available on the other aspects of sight conservation and work with the blind. I am available to attend Board meetings, Club meetings and Zone meetings to discuss and help with your concerns in this field.

The branch eye banks in our District have done a great job in providing a record number of eyes to the Wisconsin Eye Bank in Madison and the Wisconsin Lions Eye Bank in Milwaukee. However, the need is still not being met. Both eye banks have long waiting lists for corneal transplants and the both have shortages of eyes for vital research.

Dr. Michael Shapiro of the Wisconsin Eye Bank advises: "People who have had cataracts and who have had lens implants can be eye donors and their gifts are extremely valuable in providing sight". A research project currently underway is studying the long term effects of intraocular lens implants. Diabetic Retinopathy research, glaucoma research and evaluations of new drugs are a few of the many other promising programs which are affected by the shortage of donor eyes.

Dr. Shapiro adds: "An eye donation for corneal transplant can give sight to two individuals. But an eye donation for research may help give sight to literally hundreds of people."

Yes, there continues to be an urgent need for the donation of eyes for corneal transplantation and for research. We Lions must tell this to hospital personnel and others who approach families about eye donations.

A discount of 10% off the purchase price of any new hearing aid would be offered to any Lion Member purchasing a hearing aid from the Medical College of Wisconsin. In addition, the Physician Examination Fee in Connection with the fitting of a hearing aid would be waived.

Dear Lion:

In my letter to you of November 17, 1989 it was stated that the International Board of Directors had authorized a special meeting of all international directors, past international presidents and past international directors to be called for the purpose of filling the vacancy in the office of international president for the 1990-91 year.

This action was taken because of the untimely death of First Vice President Mathew Seishi Ogawa and in compliance with Article IV, Section 11 of the International Constitution and By-Laws. Official notice was issued on November 17, 1989 for the special meeting, which was scheduled for Wednesday, December 6, 1989 at the association's International Headquarters.

On November 30, 1989 the Lions Club of Norton, Virginia, USA filed a petition with the Illinois circuit court requesting that the meeting be cancelled. On Friday, December 1, 1989 a judge of that court issued a temporary restraining order preventing the association from holding the December 6 special meeting. When issuing the restraining order, the circuit court required the Lions Club of Norton, Virginia to post a bond in the amount of US\$60,000 to offset the association's expenses incurred in the meeting's cancellation. In compliance with the court order, the meeting was cancelled.

The court order was appealed, and on Friday, December 8 the Illinois appellate court decided in the association's favor by overturning the temporary restraining order. Now that the appellate court has determined the restraining order was erroneously issued, the association may be entitled to recover damages under the \$60,000 bond. We are currently awaiting further direction from the court in this regard. There is another court hearing on January 11, 1990 to determine whether or not the special meeting can be rescheduled. I will keep you informed of future developments in the matter.

I am very grateful for the many kind and thoughtful letters from Lions all over the world concerning the death of our beloved Vice President Ogawa and the process for choosing his successor. Thank you for your support in helping us meet this very special challenge, and Ginny joins me in wishing you and your family a very happy 1990 filled with joy, peace and good health.

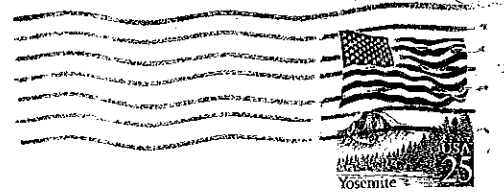
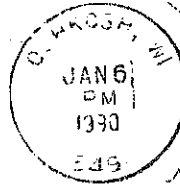

Dear Lions and Lionesses:

The 1989-90 Mid-Year Report has been received from International President William L. Woolard. Progress has been made in all the challenges he presented in his program for the year. Here is a summary of the progress in the seven challenges:

- Blindness:** The long term sight program will be launched at the International Convention in St. Louis in July. This program analyzes the challenge which awaits Lions in the prevention of blindness and details all that will be necessary for Lions to carry out this far-reaching humanitarian mission.
- Drug Awareness:** The Lions-Quest "Skills for Growing" and "Skills for Adolescence" programs have met with great success. These programs will continue for at least two more years as voted on by the International Board of Directors in November.
- Diabetes:** Lions throughout the world are maintaining their course in meeting the challenge of diabetes by sponsoring screening programs, providing diabetes education and supporting research into finding a cure for diabetic retinopathy.
- LCIF:** LCIF continues to expand in helping Lions meet demanding human needs around the world. Since July, 1989, \$2,427,284 has been contributed to the foundation. Grants in excess of \$4.6 million have been approved.
- Membership:** Membership has increased by 9,542 since July 1. There are more than 23,700 women belonging to Lions Clubs. There are 83 new Lioness clubs certified since July 1. 122 new Leo clubs have been established since July 1. We need to continue to have growth in Lions, Lioness and Leo clubs to meet human needs around the world.
- Knowledge:** More information is being provided about the operations of the organization. Articles are appearing in THE LION magazine describing our association.
- Greatness:** By everyone doing their very best we will achieve this challenge. The Lions Code of Ethics guides us in our continuing role as the largest, the most active, the *greatest* service club organization in the world.

LIONS CAMP SETS ATTENDANCE RECORD

The Wisconsin Lions Camp located near Rosholt, announced a record attendance of 2,872 persons served during 1989. A total of 1,739 visually handicapped, hearing impaired, and educable mentally handicapped children were served during the summer camping program. While an additional 1,132 persons were served in the off-season programs operating from September thru May. The off-season programs serve special education classes, disabled groups, and organizations serving the handicapped. The summer program is provided free of charge to the participants as a result of Lions and Lioness Club donations. Additional funding is received from private donors.

"The record attendance caps off a decade of expanded services", according to Bob Welch, Camp board chairman. Attendance records have been set seven of the past ten years, as the Lions Camp expanded its summer capacity to 150 campers per week, and moved into year-round programming. During the 1980's the kitchen and dining hall were expanded, a nature center and trading post were built, year-round conference center constructed, sewer system installed, and a major lake dredging project completed. The Wisconsin Lions Camp is a project of the Wisconsin Lions Foundation, and is owned and operated by the Lions Clubs of Wisconsin.

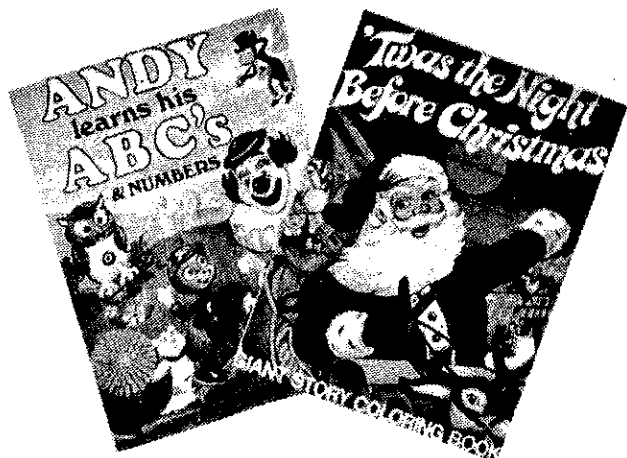

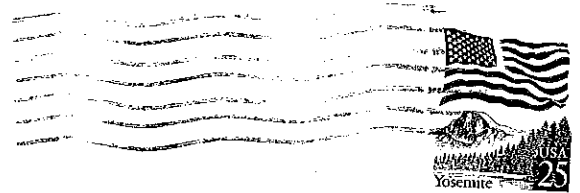
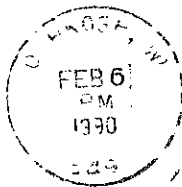

Dear Lions and Lionesses:

The guidelines for a global sight program are now being developed. Resource experts and Lions Clubs International representatives recently met at headquarters and finalized outlines for guidelines on the local, regional and national levels. Details for the new sight program will be announced at the 1990 International Convention in St. Louis.

In the past few months Past International Director Helmer Lecy was the featured speaker at three anniversaries in our District. During his speeches he asked all those in attendance to contribute nine cents. This is the amount required to provide vitamin A for one child for one year in Africa to prevent blindness. The funds collected were forwarded to Robert J. Uplinger, Past International President and Lions Liaison to the United Nations. He delivered the funds to the World Health Organization representative at the United Nations. We don't realize what an amount such as nine cents can accomplish.

This is the third month in the District Membership Growth program. Have you invited someone to join your club? Club membership shouldn't be limited. 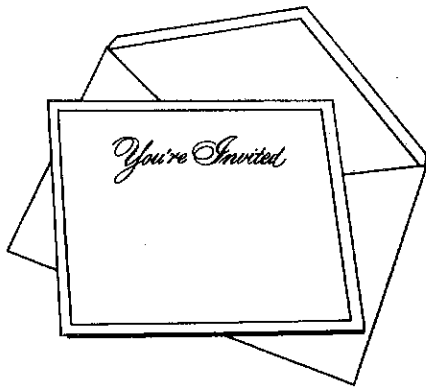

WISCONSIN LIONS FOUNDATION
MEMORIAL DONATIONS

The Lions and Lioness of Wisconsin can perpetuate the work being done by the Wisconsin Lions Foundation through participation in the MEMORIAL DONOR PROGRAM. As Lions and Lioness, we have the opportunity to honor our brothers and sisters in Lionism when their life on earth ends, by making a donation, in their name, to the Wisconsin Lions Foundation.

Death is a part of Life's process. What better way can we keep the memory of our loved ones burning than to create a Memorial to them and at the same time, continue to help the Visually Impaired, the Hearing Handicapped and the Mentally Retarded.

The process to accomplish this is simple. At most funeral homes you will find a Sympathy Memorial Card from the Wisconsin Lions Foundation which contains a mailing envelope, sympathy card and a memorial gift envelope for the purpose of designating memorials. The Sympathy card can be given to the family of the deceased at the funeral home or postmarked after the memorial service. The Sympathy card indicates to the family that you have made a Memorial Donation in the name of their departed Loved One to the Wisconsin Lions Foundation. At your convenience, you can complete the Memorial Gift Envelope, insert your check and designate the name of the person for whom the donation is being made and mail it to the Wisconsin Lions Foundation.

The donation will be received at the Wisconsin Lions Foundation office and will be processed. The Executive Director of the Foundation will forward an acknowledgement to the family noting that a memorial has been received from you. In addition, as donor, you will receive a Thank You for your donation and another Memorial envelope and Sympathy Card for future memorials.

In each issue of the Wisconsin Lions Magazine there is a section where donor Memorials are listed. The list contains the names of those "IN MEMORY" in bold type and those who donated immediately below. Also listed are the donors of Honorary or Appreciation Memorials and those who donated on their behalf.

To make the Wisconsin Lions Foundation Donor Memorial Program work, the Lions and Lioness of Wisconsin need to remember that a Memorial Donation on behalf of a Loved One has a lasting benefit. Although flowers and sprays are thoughtful and sincerely appreciated, most often there are too many for the family to use after the services and these gifts of remembrance end up going to waste. Consider the Memorial Donation to the Wisconsin Lions Foundation. It will do more good for the less fortunate and will be appreciated just as much by the family of the deceased.

HEARING AND SPEECH PROGRAM
THE PORTABLE BRAINSTEM EVOKED RESPONSE
UNIT

Our brain is actually a very sophisticated computer. It produces electrical signals that allow us to think, speak, hear, see, smell, feel, taste, move, etc. These electrical signals of an active brain can be measured by what is called an Electro-Encephalo-Graph or EEG. Small electrodes are placed on the scalp and this electrical activity is recorded.

Brainstem evoked responses are those specific electrical events that are evoked or occur as a result of an specific stimulus being applied to the body. Our interest is in auditory evoked responses, or those signals produced by the brain in response to sounds presented to the ears.

Because of the great electrical activity of a normally functioning brain, it would be impossible to detect the specific electrical signal produced by a single sound presented to the ear. By feeding the EEG data through a small computer, all the background electrical activity can be eliminated and the specific electrical signal or evoked response of a single sound can be detected. By precise timing and measurement, the speed with which these nerve impulses are transmitted from the inner ear to the brain can be determined. This allows us to observe how well these nerves of hearing are functioning.

This technique of measuring brain electrical activity resulting from sound stimulation of the ear allows us to measure hearing ability in patients who are unable to respond or cooperate with traditional testing techniques. It allows hearing testing of new born infants and persons who are unconscious. By determining the smallest intensity of sound that produces an electrical signal in the brain, we can estimate the patient's hearing ability.

The Portable Brainstem Evoked Response Unit allows us to detect hearing losses in high risk newborn infants. Whereas, previously we had to wait until these youngsters were almost two years old before we could test them. Now we can begin hearing rehabilitation at a much earlier age.

This Unit is also useful in the operating room. Our newer surgical techniques allow us to operate on and near the nerves of hearing. Taking this Unit into the operating room will provide the surgeon ample warning when his manipulations are threatening the hearing apparatus.

Besides collecting used eye glasses, we also are looking for used hearing aids. Give them to your Zone Chairman and he will bring them to the Cabinet meetings and I will forward them to Wisconsin Lions Hearing Center in Milwaukee.

INTERCHANGE

INTERVIEWING A PROSPECTIVE MEMBER

The following are some suggested questions that may prove helpful in determining a potential member's attitude, values, interpersonal relations, emotional stability and motivations (achievement, power or affiliation). These questions need to be changed or adapted to your own style and needs, and the particular situation. The important thing they suggest is how to phrase questions to enable people to more openly talk about themselves.

Following are examples on open-ended interviewing questions:

1. What do you like to do in your leisure time? (VALUES)
2. Have you ever done volunteer work?
If yes, what did you enjoy the least?
If yes, what did you enjoy the most? (ATTITUDES)
3. What things have you done that have given you the most satisfaction? (MOTIVATION AND VALUES)
4. What kind of people do you work with best as co-workers?
Are there types of people you most interested in associating with?
Are there types of people you feel you would be unable to work with? (INTERPERSONAL RELATIONS)
5. Why do you think you might be interested in joining Lions and volunteering your time to help the community? (MOTIVATION)
6. What is your "energy" or "activity level" and how would you describe your work habits? (WORK HABITS)
7. Thinking back, what are the most significant decisions you have made in your life and how do you feel about them? (DECISION MAKING)
8. What really makes you angry--on the job or at home--and how do you deal with this anger? (EMOTIONAL STABILITY)
9. Tell me about your family. (EMOTIONAL STABILITY)
10. What kind of supervision do you prefer? (MOTIVATION)
11. Describe your temperament. What do you like best about yourself? (EMOTIONAL STABILITY)

We hope these questions will serve as a useful guide when interviewing prospective members.

NEW CLUB MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

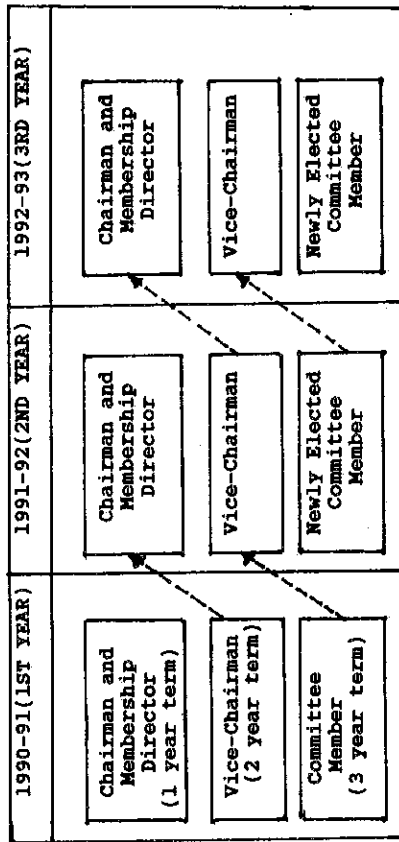
Soon you will be electing the 1990-91 slate of officers for your club. For the first time, there will be an election of a new three member Club Membership Committee.
