16. Committee Reports

a. IPDG BJ Blahnik (Report 1-B)

Status Update on ABCM Playground by IPDG BJ Blahnik Above & Beyond Children's Museum (ABCM) Purple Octopus Playground Matching Grant. \$50,000, FROM LCIF, was received and submitted to ABCM. B1 raised \$26,225 in total and matching \$25,000 was received from personal donation from Jay Christopher. This totaled \$101,225 towards this project from B1. ABCM's goal was a total project of \$500,000. Ground has been broken and playground pieces are beginning to be constructed. Money raised was for the rubber surfacing around the playground equipment. Will continue to monitor progress and keep both LCIF and B1 updated.

c. 2nd Vice District Governor Lion Dave Holschbach (Report 2-1 & 2-N)

o. District LCIF Coordinator Lion Mary Jo Abler

Campaign 100 has closed. It was a great success. It appears the Foundation goal was met and exceeded. Final numbers have not been released yet, but looks to be \$340,000,000. As of 7/22/22 our District numbers indicate this year's total to be \$140,177.3750 of our 63 clubs donated, that is nearly 80% of our clubs. Three clubs have been awarded Model Club status. I think we have maybe 3 more that took the opportunity to Pledge their balance. (Over half way to goal) When they meet their goal, they will be listed. With the Pledge paperwork being sent in, it will give those clubs up to 3 years to make the goal. Two very large personal donations really put us over the top. All the personal donations were greatly appreciated. I want to try to get to every Zone to talk about our Foundation in the next year. I have emailed the Zone chairs that request and wait for their replies on setting dates. I would prefer not to do winter months, especially across the district. The position of LCIF Club Chair is still part of the club officers. If clubs do not have someone listed, the secretary will get any information I might send out. I would suggest, the clubs appoint someone and get it into LCI directory. Just don't send back to me an email that the person is not the Club Chair! I think non secretary would be better. Secretaries have so many things they are involved in. Some clubs were still not aware of Campaign 100. The word was not getting to membership. Someone that really would like to know more about our Foundation and how it works. Then promote it to club.

p. District Leader Dog PDG Lion Meg Post (Report 2-L)

Leader Dog chair PDG Lion Meg Post Leader Dog would like to extend a huge thank you to all Lions clubs for their continued support and generous donations this past fiscal year. MD-27 donated a total of \$187,814.87. That is over \$51,000 more than last fiscal year. Great Job!! Our district donated \$26,735. We were not first this year-we were beat out by A1 (\$56,873.50). Leader Dog matched 116 dogs with clients this past fiscal year. Orientation & Mobility (White Cane) served 90 clients. Clients came from 39 states and also Alberta, British Columbia, Ontario, Nova Scotia, and Spain. Summer Experience Camp welcomed 14 teens ages 16 & 17 back to campus this year. Students from 10 different states came together for a week of leadership and independent travel skill training, crafts, rope course challenges and more! The teens surprised the LD technology team with a few added benefits of the handheld GPS units! Leader Dog will again welcome 1st VDG's to visit the campus during August and September. Taking the Lead podcasts have been a huge success. You can listen to all of the podcasts via the LD website. The goal of this podcast is to bring awareness of not only the blindness community but also the free services provided by Leader Dog. Please take time to check out the Leader Dog website. There are client videos, monthly newsletters, club reports and of course the gift shop. Feel free to contact me with any questions or to schedule a club visit. q. District Leo Chair PDG Lion Gary Silah

Chair Lion Gary Silah was present, reported that we currently have one Leo Club-New Holstein chartered in 2017 and have 22 members and one in Reedsville started in 2012 but has no reports in LCI. He will be doing more research into this and getting back to us.

r. District Lions Eyebank of Wisconsin Lion Charlie Keifenheim

Director Lion Chuck Keifenheim not present but PCC Dean Haas spoke and said that they had for the first time since COVID that had 100 donors and the building has sold.

s. District Membership Retention Chair Lion Dave Holschbach (Report 2-M)

We are off to a bad start as of July 13th, we have dropped 15 members from 4 clubs. We realized most of these should have been done before year end. I have stressed in my secretary training that members should show as dropped in MyLCI when the club got notified, even if they have paid their dues thru the end of the billing whether 12/31 or 6/30. REMEMBER your club shows them on your roster effective January 1 and July 1 and your club will be billed for them as a member by LCI and the state, NO CREDITS will be issued!! I have been asked by District Governor Dave to be the RETENTION chair. My focus will be to get accurate member numbers and work with clubs to RETAIN their membership. We will try to avoid having to go to exit interviews. I will be in contact with club secretary to see how things are going.

v. District Pediatric Cancer Chair PDG Lion Dave Lee (Report 1D & 1F)

Pediatric Cancer by PDG Lion Dave Lee. Although I will not be attending the upcoming B1 cabinet meeting, here are several thoughts regarding district childhood cancer: Lion SRI and PDG Dave led an initiative for the Council of Governors (2021-2022) to approve a concept of endorsing a Wisconsin Lions Childhood Cancer Foundation – unfortunately the DG vote was 5 'for' and 5 'opposed'. IPDG BJ was appointed by the Council of Governors as the ad hoc committee chair for this proposal in 2021-2022, and the august committee group (cc'd above) was in favor of the COG endorsing this initiative. Given the obvious statewide enthusiasm among Wisconsin Lions for supporting childhood cancer and the fact that this is one of the five global focus areas for LCI, the DG voting outcome was disappointing. It would take virtually a unanimous request from the 2022-2023 district governors for Lion SRI and me to consider renewing efforts along these lines. For possible district-only childhood cancer activities this year, here are several ideas: We could have a special breakfast the morning of the district convention that would be dedicated to a childhood cancer fundraiser. It could include an interesting speaker with a brief message (example Joe Dean), there could be voluntary donations made by attendees, and/or clubs could be encouraged to take up cash collections on behalf of childhood cancer and make these donations at the breakfast. A 50:50 raffle could help build the fund. Joe Dean (formerly with the MACC Fund) is the author of My Dog Named Hope, which is a children's book about a family dealing with childhood cancer. A program could be created to fund the purchase of these books for distribution within the district. Lion SRI has provided an LCI idea sheet for possible childhood cancer projects which is attached. Clubs within the district should be actively considering how they can give service to childhood cancer efforts. Of course, the initiative that we feel has the most merit is launching a Wisconsin Lions Childhood Cancer Foundation, but this effort would need to be embraced' by current DGs for us to be willing to proceed. x. District Research and Planning Committee Lion Dave Holschbach (Report 2-K)

The immediate focus will be to work with Constitution and Bylaws to get proper documentation on the district website, we have too many versions and the district policies they need to be updated.

y. District Restoring Hope Transplant House Lion Barb Leichtfuss (Report 2-P)

House update by Lion Barb Leichtfuss. June 2022 • Our occupancy rates have returned to pre-Covid numbers as transplants and hospital restrictions have normalized

closer to normal. • The new Program Director for Transplant at UW Health visited RHTH last week and was so moved by our efforts that she would like to volunteer on a monthly basis. She will also be promoting the house throughout the transplant program and is excited to get more engaged in the fundraising efforts for expansion. This was a truly exciting meeting as our ongoing relationship with UW Hospital is so vital. This house is a perfect complement to a world-class transplant hospital and in the words of the head of transplantation, "the greatest resource for our transplant families!" • For the moment, UW Hospital is now allowing 2 caregivers per day to visit each family. This is a huge difference in the support of patients and also for our overall guest stays. • The new UW Health Transplant Clinic is finally scheduled to open in a few months. That project, made possible by a generous donation from Pleasant Rowland has endured many of the increases and significant delays we have feared with our own construction. When finished, it will be such a major improvement for our families and make our work here at RHTH even more critical going forward. • We have continued to see a record number of guests from the Milwaukee, Kenosha, Racine areas after Froedtert stopped performing some critical types of organ transplants. Had a night this past week with 3 Milwaukee families. • With Covid precautions in place, we are very proud of the fact that no cases of Covid have ever been traced back to RHTH. This is especially critical given the immune compromised cases we see in transplantation. Covid remains a very serious issue in the transplant community. As such, we maintain similar standards to the hospital for the protection of our high-risk guests. • Lions from several area clubs continue to find ways to support this house from speaking on our behalf, maintenance, opening new doors, donation much needed food and supplies to volunteer work days...it all makes such a huge difference. We have certified trainer throughout our district, and we wanted to become more independent. In March we had 50 brand new Lions trainers come in and 6 into our district. Mary Jo asked if we should get recertified after so many years. Refresher courses are always good.

<u>PINE RIDGE INDIAN RESERVATION</u> While we haven't yet been successful getting another eyeglass mission there we have taken three loads of things to the Families Working Together Foundation located on the reservation. The Kesslers and us each pulled a trailer load out there in December and the Kesslers went out again in

June. Hopefully we will be able to make the right connections to have another mission there soon. A couple things we learned about the items we take out there. They have no use for knickknacks and other items that are mostly decorative/ornamental. What they do need is sporting goods like basketballs, baseballs, bats, ball gloves etc. Let's work on that. And of course, they continue to need household items, winter clothing, and more.

<u>Our EMERGENCY RESPONSE TEAM</u> reached out to the LIONS OF KENTUCKY to see if we could help the victims of the December 10th tornado. Lion Pat Knier first brought up the idea and ultimately worked with the clubs in his zone to collect a trailer load of needed items. We sent out a communication statewide and had a very good response. Many clubs and individuals responded with financial assistance as well as donations of items needed. We collected about \$10,000 to support the mission. In late April we left for Mayfield, KY with the Lions trailer full. We connected with Lion Knier in Mayfield where both trailers were unloaded at a large distribution center. They were excited about things unloaded. Past International Director Eugenio Roman and Lion Tom Bredesen have been planning an eyeglass mission to the Dominican Republic. He and his wife have a team of people who have worked out the logistics to conduct a mission in Higuey, Dominican Republic from Sunday, February 5th until Sunday, February 12, 2023.





Important Change to Policy and Procedures Manual

As of this current year, the position of Cabinet Secretary-Treasurer has been split into two separate posts. Frankly, as a former 3-time CST, I applaud separating these two difficult and important jobs for our district.

This change, however, does necessitate a change in our policy and procedures manual. Compensation for the rooms at the District Convention is based on the combined position. It is my belief that these provided rooms are not a perk or a gift for the Secretary and Treasurer. They are provided because both of these Lions are needed to be at the convention for the entire time and are a necessary expense for the convention.

Therefore, I am bringing the following modification to the Policy and Procedures Manual before the Cabinet. I believe that this needs to be passed immediately and put into effect before the 2022 District Convention.

The District Convention Policy currently reads:

As a kid who grew up in a small, rural town of barely 3,000 people, small trips to other states or a school trip to Washington D.C. can seem like a big deal. However, as someone who also grew up listening to their Dad's stories of all the places he's been to around the world, I dreamed of bigger trips and bigger adventures. The Lions Club gave me my first opportunity to travel out of the United States, and with their help, I was able to spend two and a half wonderful weeks in Poland.

While there, not only was I able to be a full-on tourist, reading every single informational pamphlet and buying an excessive amount of refrigerator magnets, I was also able to become fully immersed in their culture. This opportunity blessed me with being able to stay with three different, wonderful host families. They fed me pierogi and pork chops, taught me about their history, and helped me when I became unbelievably frustrated when I was unable to tell whether the bottled water was carbonated or not. I also easily made friends; and I am not good at meeting new people. I get anxious, weird, and standoff-ish. I'm not even good at talking to my own relatives sometimes, but the people I met while on this trip changed my life and made me feel very welcome. During the Lions Youth Exchange Camp stay in Poland, I met people from around the entire world and made lasting friendships and, kind-of, learned how to sail and tie some knots. During my stay there, I learned about so many different cultures. I bonded with people over simply just describing what an average day for me in the United States is like. I'm not going to lie, I thought it was going to be awkward when we all started talking about our different cultures, I was expecting some fighting about politics and stuff like that; that never happened. Instead, while we were sharing our different cultures and our lives, we learned that we were not so different. We all understood and could empathize, to a certain extent, with everyone's experiences through life. We all had anxieties, we all had weird family members, we all liked playing volleyball, and most importantly, we all had no idea what we were doing when we were sailing.

Never in my life have I ever made friends so easily, and not just a friend you only talk to once a year because you are wishing them a happy birthday over facebook, but actual life-long friends. I made deeper connections with the people I met during this trip, then I did with anyone I spent those four years of highschool with. I became so close with my actual assigned host family I cried when I realized I only had one more day with them. I cried when the mini vacation to the Baltic Sea, where two other host families temporarily adopted me, was over. I bawled my eyes out when I left the Lions Club Camp, and I mean bawled. He and his wife have a team of people who have worked out the logistics to conduct a mission in Higuey, Dominican Republic from Sunday, February 5th until Sunday, February 12, 2023.

encourage	them to try first are: Medicaid (Title 19), their local Department of Vocational Rehabilitation
(DVR), GAN	MP, Katie Beckett Program (contact your local Department of Health and Human Services),
and Badge	r Care Plus.

People in need of assistance should fill out an application which can be obtained from the WLF office. An applicant's finical eligibility is carefully reviewed by the District Hearing Chairperson and is either approved or denied. The number of eligible people you can assist depends completely on the amount of funds you have available in your District.

The Hearing Program is a very worthy cause and is <u>Funded Solely</u> through the <u>collection and</u> <u>salvage of used hearing aids and through donations from your District, Zones, and local Lion & Leo Clubs</u>. I encourage that you have raised. Checks should be sent to the WLF and should be made <u>payable</u> to <u>Wisconsin Lions Foundation</u> with a notation in the memo – 27-B1 Hearing Program. That will assure your donation will get to the right place.

I also encourage All Lion & Leo Clubs to start collecting use d hearing aids. Some suggested places to ask are local churches, pharmacies, funeral homes, nursing homes, and Doctors/Audiologists/Hearing Instruments Specialists' offices. Designate a person(s) from your club to distribute canisters – small plastic buckets – (with their name and Club and contact info on it) who will pick up the donated hearing aids. You can get canisters from WLF in Rosholt or contact me. You can also encourage the general public in your community to donate their unwanted or unused/used hearing aids to this program via posters or newspaper ads.

A Purple Octopus is Coming to Town

Lions of District B1, we are very excited to announce a LCIF Grant has been submitted for a total project of \$100,000 with \$50,000 to be raised by the Lions of District B1. This project will be to support the construction of the Purple Octopus Playground at the Above & Beyond Children's Museum in Sheboygan, Wisconsin. You may ask yourself, why would the Lions and Lions Clubs who do not live in the Sheboygan area support a project like this when it is not close to my town? That is a great question and our answer is, this is more than a playground.

The Above & Beyond Children's Museum (ABCM) is a location where children can go to learn, explore and make memories with their families. Children have the ability to be interactive with all things onsite. This means development of fine motor skills, the art of learning how something works and a safe area to just have fun. Many schools outside the Sheboygan Area will bus their students to this location for field trips which truly makes ABCM open to everyone. The Purple Octopus Playground will be a location for all abilities to play and open to the public for no charge. The playground will be available 24/7 for all to enjoy.

The overall cost of the project is \$500,000 and with the Lions support we will be contributing \$100,000 which will be used to provide the final rubber stamp and give the Purple Octopus its home. The rubber surfacing which will provide safety for all, while children and families are playing on and around the Purple Octopus as well as have varying colors to help the visually impaired to know, for instance, how far the swings come out and avoid being hit or kicked. The idea of just supplying a rubber surfacing may not be all that exciting but in fact, it is the most important part of the playground. Without this important step, the playground would not meet the requirements to be disclosed as an all-abilities playground and would also not allow for the 5 Start ADA Accessible rating.

For those of you who do not know how a matching grant works. The Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) matching grant works like this. Lions clubs, within a District, apply to LCIF for supporting a project, before it begins, based on specific criteria. The Lions will raise half of the money and if approved, LCIF will donate the remaining half. This money comes from your yearly donations to LCIF and when a club or individual donates more than \$1,000 you have the opportunity to receive a Melvin Jones recognition plaque. This plaque is considered a very personal recognition because your gift, and the interest raised from it, will echo into the future and help make our world a better place. The Sheboygan Evening, Sheboygan Noon and Town of Sheboygan Lions Clubs have committed to rbe the primary sponsors of the Purple Octopus Playground as well as a donation from a private donor to support the cause. A Purple Octopus is Coming to Town

Narrative Details

· 5. Describe the local situation that encouraged the Lions to pursue this project.

5) The Above & Beyond Children's Museum successfully installed a 5-star certified ADA and All Abilities-accessible public outdoor playground at the Above & Beyond Children's Museum outdoor green space. This project was born of the understanding that Downtown Sheboygan did not have a public outdoor play space designed specifically for children that is ADA & All Abilities-accessible. Installing a playground within the City limits now guarantees that people of all socio-economic levels can engage with it. The playground has all-access components including a wheelchair transfer platform in the head of the octopus, a ground level accessible nest swing, and all-around ground level heights for accessing equipment. The rubber surfacing for which MD27-B1 requested funding has multiple colors to clearly display different surface heights and a darker color under the swing set to show visually-impaired persons how far the swing will swing out.

· 6. Provide a detailed description of the grant project activities and the benefit to the community.

6) At the completion of the equipment installation, Lions Club rubber surfacing was poured and in place by July 2022. The rubber surfacing guarantees safety to all who play on the playground. Fall heights were carefully measured to ensure a soft landing for children. The multiple colors clearly mark the difference in heights throughout the playground and a darker color under the swing set outlines the swing radius for visually-impaired persons.

· 7. Did the project achieve its goal? If not, explain.

7) The playground has been a resounding success. It is fully accessible and the rubber surfacing is a main highlight of the space with its vibrant colors and softer surface that adds an extra layer of protection for all who visit.

· 8. Detail any challenges Lions faced in implementing the project.

8) The Above & Beyond Children's Museum met with one challenge as concepts for the rubber surfacing were decided. The colors had to have enough difference between tones to discern between them and many of the colors were very similar. As a solution, the museum director worked with the rubber surfacing company to infuse brighter crystals and darker crystals into the standard tones to ensure the color difference was obvious. As for any challenges from a Lions perspective, there were no challenges raising the funds for this project.

· 9. Number of Lions members directly involved in the implementation of the project?

9) With regards to support from the MD27B1 Lions, we had full support from the B1 District cabinet and from club perspective we hadparticipation from roughly half of the clubs located within the B1 District. On the day of the grand opening, we had representation from 10+ local clubs & Cabinet members. In an estimated total of all of these clubs and District, an estimated 1,000 Lions were involved to help this cause be a success.

Impact on Grant Beneficiaries

· 10. Number of direct beneficiaries from the grant funded project. Explain how this total was calculated.

10) Sheboygan County has a population of 115,340, and 27% of that population is youth. We anticipated, in its first year, that 25% of those youth and their families would visit the playground at least once, equaling an estimate of 7,786 attendees in the first year. The playground has already seen around 7,000 attendees utilize the play space according to grand opening attendance numbers.

· 11. Number of in-direct beneficiaries from the grant funded project. Explain how this total was calculated.

11) The entire population of Sheboygan County (115,340) benefits from the playground as a space to meet and gather due to the surrounding landscaping in the green space. Additionally, tourists to Sheboygan benefit from the play space, or 8,000 to 10,000 attendees annually, according to the County's tourism statistics.

· 12. Did the project provide a short or long-term impact? If the grant project is expected to provide an ongoing impact in the community, please estimate this impact in future years for direct and indirect beneficiaries.

12) As a long-term outdoor exhibit, the playground is meant to last at least 10 years though with routine maintenance that number will likely double. With 8,000 to 10,000 visitors estimated on an annual basis, the playground is projected to welcome at least 80,000 in the next 10 years.

· 13. Explain how this project helped the community to learn more about Lions.

13) The Above & Beyond Children's Museum highlighted the involvement of the Lions Club in the project through social media posts, inclusion in newspaper press releases, inclusion in all newsletter mentions of the playground, and through Lions Club volunteers being at assorted events leading up to the Grand Opening Celebration. Additionally, the Lions Club MD27-B1 and LCIF were recognized at the Celebration event and on the donor plaque for the playground.*As for direct showcase on how the Lions impact this project now and in the future are based off of not only logoing and media awareness, the public is made aware of how Lions make a difference when tours are given talking about the Centennial Trees planted on site, which were donated by the District for our Environmental goals, discussions why the Lions focused on the rubber surfacing with multiple colors to help the Visually Impaired and Lions engraving within the surrounding pickets. Information is on display at the museum and it is clearly defined both organizations are there to help support our youth.14. District Leader Dog, Lion PDG Meg Post

As of December 16, 2022, B1 donations to Leader Dog total, \$14,892.00. A huge thank you to IPDG BJ Blahnik and his club, Town of Sheboygan Lions, for their generous donation of \$5,000 as part of the Lion's Bank Auction at our district convention in November. Also, a huge thank you to 1st VDG Greg and his wife Amy, for their generous donation of \$2,000 with the winning bid for PDG Quinn's Cowboy Hat. Leader Dog is very thankful for these generous donations!

Second quarter update (July 2022 thru December 2022) shows 69 Leader Dogs have been placed with clients. Orientation & Mobility (White Cane) clients: 65.

Summer Experience is provided free of charge at Leader Dogs for the Blind's Rochester Hills, Michigan campus to those who are legally blind, 16 or 17 years of age, (24 students accepted on a first come first serve basis) regardless of whether they plan to train with a guide dog. Public transportation to and from a client's home to the Leader Dog campus and accommodations and meals while training is also provided free of charge. This free program combines fun activities with exploring mobility options like guide dog travel, discovering leadership skills and building friendships with peers facing similar challenges. Campers receive a free Human Ware GPS to help increase their travel independence. They also have the opportunity to learn about living and working with a guide dog. This program will take place the week of June 25th thru July 1st.

The United Kingdom guide dog organization has over 1,000 people on its waiting list. They reached out to Leader Dog to see if they could help. After sharing their applications, Leader Dog screened them and selected 4 people who have had guide dogs in the past. The UK sent their Guide Dog mobility specialists (training professionals) and these 4 clients to Leader Dog in September and they received Leader Dogs and our training. The UK Guide Dog mobility specialists will continue to support the UK clients in their home country.

The Team that trained Leader Dogs for people who are Deaf-blind had now expanded its services thanks to a partnership with PAWS for a Cause. Deader Dog team members recently trained Future Leader Dog "Mio" to meet all of Leader Dog's guide dog standards and then they turned "Mio" over to a PAWS with a Cause team member who then trained "Mio" to also respond to the needs of a client who is Blind and has additional mobility needs due to cerebral palsy. It is Leader Dogs hope that combining the expertise of both organizations will allow Leader Dog to better serve the diverse needs of their clients.

You can also listen to client stories as well as check out the Leader Dog Fast Facts. All are very interesting. As you can see, your donations are being put to good use.

Special Olympics Wisconsin (SOWI) is offering free health screenings at the Special Olympics Wisconsin Spring Sports Tournament in Oshkosh on April 15, 2023. Opening Eyes is one of four health screenings being offered. It provides vision assessments to SOWI athletes. Athletes in need of prescription glasses receive dress and/or sport/swim goggles, which are mailed to their local program manager about 10-12 weeks after the event. Higuey, Dominican Republic. The mission is set for February 5-12, 2023. There will be 4 Lions Clubs from the DR helping with the mission. 11,844 pairs of glasses were shipped to Higuey.

Domestic Mission Needs

August of this year brought heavy rains (21 inches in 2 hours) to southeast Kentucky

hill country and caused horrific flooding, killing 18 people and destroying 100's of homes,

bridges, and more. In October the Kessler's pulled one Lions trailer and Lion Bill Taubman another and delivered 2 loads of household items to help people in Hindman and Neon KY. Again, greatly appreciated.

In September the Kessler's made a trip to the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation with a

load of household items for them. All of this is made possible because of the support of

Lions from all over the state.

It was generally agreed that going forward everyone will have to have been through a more

advanced training session before you will be able to participate in a mission. It is our

responsibility to organize training opportunities for you and it is your responsibility to

participate. Thus, a training session was held after the meeting.

Some years ago, WLM volunteered to assist the Recycling Center by picking up loads

of glasses in Nebraska and later expanded to include South Dakota and Iowa. It was a

somewhat selfish offer because we wanted the recycling center to have a good supply of

glasses so that we could get the glasses and prescriptions that we need for our missions.

Since that time about every ten months, we go to Omaha and get 100,000 or more used

glasses. Every couple year we go to Sioux Falls. While we have picked up 11,000 - 13,000

from a club in Iowa for the last few years, now we get all of Iowa's.

District Restoring Hope Transplant House Lion Barb Leichtfuss

Restoring Hope Transplant House January, 2023 I had the opportunity to have a lengthy telephone call with Cindy Herbst at the House. Her first statement was that things were going "very well". But they have their hands very full at this time. She describes their business as being "over the top" as the home residents are very sick, much more than usual. This leads to the staff working especially hard and sometimes facing burnout. "Stretched to the limit" over the past 4 months. They have received some help from the transplant staff that work at UW-M who come in as volunteers. The residents' caregivers are also facing increased weariness and anxiety as they deal with very sick individuals and are often sent home with a lot on their plate. This includes physically assisting the resident as well as financial burdens, which have been made worse by the current state of the economy: prices of groceries, gas, heating, etc. Also, because of the economy, they are moving slowly in their construction plans. Rather than planning on having their expansion completed by this summer, it will be at least closer to fall if not later. Prices of materials are very high right now, as we all know. During the COVID epidemic, the house lost about \$200k, so they are trying to get caught up financially. Because of this, the house is considering raising the nightly rates to \$45.00 which doesn't sound like a lot, but the people that stay there are dismayed that the price is going up. They have been hit with not only health issues, but financial issues that accompany the illness and treatment costs/losses. I asked what help she needed most, so I am listing a few ideas she gave me: Gift cards to Target or Aldi's; she declined groceries because of the special dietary needs of the residents. CASH Hobby like items: magazines, puzzles, puzzle books, farmers' almanacs: new or used Note: The magazines most appreciated are about nature, Wisconsin, etc. Glamour and travel magazines are unrealistic in lifting their spirits; these things are low on their priority list due to their illness and confinement. THEY NO LONGER NEED TOILETRY ITEMS. Please pass these needs on to all of our district clubs. Cindy also mentioned that many of the recipients at the house are not aware of all the Lions Clubs do; she does have pamphlets to hand out but I guess we need to "tell our story" (Thanks Dave!) loud and clear! One thing she would like is if we would plan on coming on a weekend to do cleaning at the house. Let's plan a weekend and get it done! Anyone helping at the house needs to have had the COVID vaccines and wear a mask while there. 

PDG Fred and I are working on a grant for the eye glass trainer. I think we have our direction now.


I have also an interest in the Mt Calvary Ambulance Service. (They have transported me 2 times!!)



HEART OF THE VALLEY LIONS CLUB - On July 30, the Club held a Stuff the Bus event at Walmart on Calumet St. in Appleton. It was made possible by a number of generous supporters, including Kobussen Bus Inc. in Kaukauna and Dixon Ticonderoga in Appleton. The club worked with the schools to identify a list of the most needed supplies. They received an overwhelming response from the community. In addition to supply donations, they received over \$2,000 in monetary donations; these monies were used to purchase gift cards for gym shoes.

DISTRICT 27-B1 VISION-SCREENING PROGRAM – The

school vision-screening program was started in 2014 by the Appleton Noon Lions after purchasing their first screening device in the fall of 2013. It was made by PediaVision and called the SPOT vision-screening camera.



Lions clubs throughout the United States have acquired the SPOT screener for use in vision-screenings. In 2015, the Wisconsin Lions Foundation received a \$100,000 LCIF Grant where each district could acquire three screening devices of their choice. B1 District chose the SPOT screener and currently has 134 trained screeners with six certified trainers. At present, B1 District has eleven SPOT vision-screening devices of which seven are district owned and four are club owned.

The screenings not only include schools but also community functions, daycares, and county fairs. In 2019 we eclipsed the 100,000 mark at 106,521 students screened with 11,584 referrals. PID Doctor **Ed Cordes** challenged the nations Lions to screen one million students between August 15, 2021, and December 31, 2021, in response to the Covid-19 school closings. District B1 came in second in the nation with 21,504 screenings and 2,709 referred. The bottom line to all these numbers are the thousands of lives we have impacted by improving the quality of vision.



Winnebago East Shore, St. Peter and Van Dyne Lions Clubs combined efforts and set up a Lions booth in the Expo Center at the Fond du Lac County Fair. They provided vision-screening to any child accompanied by an adult.



The **Cleveland Lions Club** held a vision training class in which 11 members attended and were certified. The class was conducted by certified instructor PDG Fred Gebhart. They were trained on the WelchAllyn SPOT device under the district vision-screening program.





St. Peter and Winnebago East Shore Lions Clubs set up a visionscreening training and refresher class for the upcoming school year. The training and certification were conducted by PDG Fred Gebhart in which seven Lions were certified and six Lions renewed.



Since beginning a Spot visionscreening program in 2014, the **Appleton Noon Lions Club** has vision screened more than 73,000 young people. The club has referred more than 7,000 students for professional follow up eye exams as a result of the Spot vision-screening.

Montello Lions Club held a visionscreening at Montello City Park on the first weekend of May. They screened 29 kids.


