Fox Valley Med Locker Update

The Fox Valley Lions Medical Equipment Loan Locker is a non-profit organization.

We offer access to medical equipment without charge to residents of the Fox Valley communities.

What is a medical equipment loan locker? It is a collection of new and used medical equipment and supplies housed in one place that can be loaned out at no charge to those who have a need.

How does it work? People simply show up during the hours the loan locker is open and check out the equipment they need for as long as they need it. It is a loan. There is no charge and minimal paperwork is involved. When they no longer need the equipment, they return it to the locker.

Donations are always welcomed and are used to help replace worn equipment and fund our operation and community projects. Donations must be dropped off at the locker during normal operating hours; there are no provisions for pickups at this time.

Supporting the Fox Valley Medical Equipment Loan Locker (FVLML), named in memory of MJ Tassoul, a long time Lion and former Valley business owner, are the following clubs:

Information/Public Relations/Historian by PDG Tom Clausen

The website and domain will be coming due in December. The cost is \$536.55 for the next 3 years, 2024, 25 and 26.

There are a few clubs that do not have an Internet presence. We should encourage them to get out there so people can contact them in case they are in need or want to join. It also helps publicize their events, both in promoting their club and getting people to participate in their fundraising activities. It just takes someone dedicated enough to do it.

The history we have is all published on our district's website. Clubs can add to their club history page by sending me information. Forget who I am or how to get a hold of me? Use the contact page on the district's website. Our website is located in the district's pages of the Wisconsin Lion.

New officers will be on our mailing list later this summer as soon I can get access to the International website and have a few hours to input the information into our mailing database.

District MyLCI/My Lion by IPDG Dave Brinkman

The new portal should be up and running by the week of September 11. We are working on a training program for it, and it is vitally important that we have it ready.

District LCIF Coordinator by PDG B.J. Blahnik

Thanks to Mary Jo for the excellent work she did for the District last year. Numbers are not completed yet, but it appears the District did very well for the year, with 60 of the 64 clubs contributing.

District Leader Dog by Ella Stanelle

As of this meeting, the final numbers have not been reported but as of June 14th, B1 has donated \$33,239. Once again B1 is number one in the state in donations. Leader Dog thanks all of you for your generosity. I will have a more detailed end of year report for the October cabinet meeting.

As of the end of the 3rd quarter, Leader Dog has served 96 clients and 106 Orientation and Mobility clients.

Leader Dog added a new program called Youth Orientation & Mobility. Youth O&M will provide Orientation and Mobility (white cane) instruction for 16- or 17-year-olds. Additionally, the program provides education for an adult supporter (such as a family member) to learn more about blindness, the skills their loved one uses, and how to help with O&M goals. Participants in this program stay in a local hotel and participate in the traditional training environments. All travel, meals, and hotel expenses are covered by Leader Dog. This program is one week and is scheduled based on the availability of the participants.

Within the Guide Dog Program, Leader Dog has expanded the DeafBlind program* to include adaptive services. The Leader Dog DeafBlind and Adaptive Services training program offers individualized service models for people with vision loss and additional needs. The Leader Dog team specializes in direct instruction using spoken English or American Sign Language with individuals who are DeafBlind, have mobility issues, and/or have cognitive impairments. The team emphasizes the individual and focuses on adapting instructional techniques to meet the specific needs of each student. A variety of training options are offered including home delivery, class (3 weeks), or flex. They also offer a 1:1 or 1:2 ratio for students based on everyone's needs.

Examples of clients who will be served in the Leader Dog DeafBlind and Adaptive Services training include clients with vision loss and cerebral palsy, clients who are on the Autism Spectrum, clients who have a learning disability and struggle with group instruction, clients who have a traumatic brain injury and struggle with memory and cognition, clients who are totally deaf and totally blind and uses tactile American Sign Language, clients who have balance difficulties. *Please note that we have standardized the term DeafBlind in accordance with the Helen Keller National Center, other national organizations as well as the DeafBlind community.

District Pediatric Cancer by PDG Dave Lee

A message for the District Children's Cancer Chairs for Wisconsin Lions:

- Hi to all 2022-2023 MD27 District Children's Cancer Chairs. Thank you for your ongoing efforts in support of minimizing the effects of childhood cancer add to that all that you do as a Lion and in meeting the other numerous demands, challenges, and opportunities that life throws our way. I hope that you will all be back in this same capacity for 2023-2024. If not, please let me know who might be taking over in your district.
- As an introduction, I've been a Lion since 2011 after a career in the paper industry followed by about five years with a paper museum. Sue and I have lived in Appleton all our lives we have five grown children and twelve grandchildren. Sue and I lead our Appleton Noon Lions club's Spot vision screening program with about 13,000 screenings per year. Sue is currently a zone chair and I am a PDG and outgoing treasurer/incoming secretary for the Wisconsin Lions Past District Governors group. When it comes to cancer, Sue had stage 3 colon cancer over 20 years ago; one of our daughters had stage 1 colon cancer in her 20s and is currently undergoing treatment for lymphoma in her late 40s. About three years ago I started treatment for an aggressive form of prostate cancer. I don't pretend to own cancer with our own family's experience cancer is so insipient that unfortunately we all have such stories to share. Likely why each of us have stepped up in the past as District Children's cancer chairs.
- As you all know, our respected Lion Dr. SRI stepped down early this year as MD27 State Children's Cancer Chair due to other demands. Fortunately, Lion SRI has stayed on as A2 District Children's Cancer Chair. (Applause for SRI!) I was asked to take over for Lion SRI and after considerable thought I agreed to do so.
- Recently I submitted a conceptual overview for a suggested approach for dealing with childhood cancer for this coming year. Council Chair elect BJ discussed this with the incoming District Governors and apparently there was unanimous enthusiasm for the proposal. I've been asked to submit an action plan prior to the Council of Governors July meeting. I am optimistic that it will be supported by the Council of Governors and that we will be able to launch the program statewide shortly afterwards.

There are three basic goals in the proposed action plan:

- 1) the first concerns accruing a fund -- asking every Lions club in Wisconsin to contribute \$100 for state childhood cancer during the month of September, which is Childhood Cancer Awareness Month. With an expected positive response, we should be able to raise \$50,000 or more for a childhood cancer fund. The districts may also wish to contribute.
- 2) the second concerns the process of deciding how the funds should be allocated my proposal suggests that we identify and evaluate existing entities that support families with childhood cancer in Wisconsin, working to have a geographical and population equity throughout Wisconsin. There are organizations that support families of need with cash and/or gift cards to offset their travel expenses for treatments. There are also several day camps that offer opportunities for cancer-stricken children, siblings, and families. So, while the intended funding thrust is simple in concept, it will take some effort to get to an allocation point. I think that this approach offers the benefit of greatly simplifying and reducing our logistics for helping various families these other entities have those capabilities. 3) the third goal is to have an on-going dialogue among the District Children's Cancer Chairs for sharing ideas and opportunities for possible service projects and volunteering at the club, multi-club, district, and district-teaming levels. Of course, part of the equation here is to match a need with a product or service.
- The action plan steps are laid out around these three basic goals. The District Children's Cancer Chairs can be a great help in the success of all three of these goals and the action plan. I hope that we can help to successfully create a Wisconsin Lions culture for being the difference for families of need with childhood cancer. The proposed action plan for 2023-2024 doesn't include a focus for funding equipment in one or more of Wisconsin's childhood cancer treatment centers. Focus opportunities might present themselves in the coming years, but for now our intended focus is direct relief from the financial and psychological stresses for families dealing with childhood cancer.
- The proposed 'ask' this year is for \$100 from each Wisconsin Lions club. Certainly, clubs can choose to do more, but this modest 'ask' doesn't force allocation choices for clubs between this new focus versus those other worthy Lions support areas. Also, hopefully the 'ask' amount is such that virtually every Lions club in Wisconsin can participate. Seeking a little to do a lot.
- This coming year should be interesting. Hopefully, also a year having a beneficial impact on those families dealing with childhood cancer. Thank you for your help.

b. Policy Change – District Bank bidding by 1VDG Dave Holschbach

I would like to propose a change in the current policy for bidding on the District Bank.

(NOTE: proposed changes are highlighted in yellow)

Bank will be auctioned in June every year by the current District Governor.

Highest bidder by individual, club or clubs will hold possession for one year.

Bank cannot be stolen or hidden from winning bidder.

If bank is taken, person or club that took bank will pay the sum of the highest bidder and not be allowed to bid the following year.

No other District shall be allowed to bid on bank.

Name and year will be displayed on plaque.

Money to be donated to any or all 27-B1 authorized projects.

Will count as annual donation.

Must be paid by May 31st of the current year, to be entered in the Annual Report.

Since we currently also have Len Quinn hat auction done at the convention, I would like to see the district bank as a 11 month project for all clubs not just those who attend the district convention. Change to be effective July 1st of upcoming Lions year.

Each club would be responsible for reporting by May 31 the amounts donated to the approved list of funds solicitors listed in the District Policy Manual – Authorized Soliciting Funds.

The district secretary/treasurer will be responsible to send the form to each club and a reminder in May for the final report. To prevent one club from controlling the bank, each club can only possess for a maximum of 2 consecutive years.

The wording to be changed on the policy is highlighted and should be as follows:

Bank will be awarded in June by current District Governor

Highest Club dollar donations will possess the bank for the upcoming Lion year.

Money to be donated to any or all MD 27 B1 Lions projects as noted in the District 27 B1

Policy Manual - Authorization of soliciting funds

Clubs must submit their annual report by May 31st for consideration

Add: A club is not allowed to receive the bank after 2 consecutive years of possession for one year.

Motion by Gary Roehrig, seconded by Tom Wendt to accept the new policy. Following discussion, this motion was rescinded. A new proposal by 1st VDG Dave will be submitted prior to the January cabinet meeting.

Information/Public Relations/Historian PDG Tom Clausen

Last meeting I recommended that we pay the \$528 bill for the district's website for the next 3 years. This 3 year payment allows for a reduced price rather than paying yearly. I find it hard to believe that someone thought we should look into finding a cheaper vendor. The main reason for paying the fee is to get storage, a secure website and a website that can be worked on by anyone with Internet access and the proper credentials. This fee is only \$176 per year. If that was submitted, it probably wouldn't be looked at twice. When you think that it only costs each Lion 10 cents per year for access to all district information and especially all of the history for their club and the district, you probably couldn't find a better bargain. If that history was stored the old way, it would be sitting in someone's garage in boxes collecting dust and mold. Would anyone take the effort to seek it out? This cost is less than 1/6th the price of a stamp per Lion. I say you can't get a better way to communicate with the Lions of 27-B1. I was at a state convention and someone came up to me and said our website "sets the standard for district websites." Something I take pride in.

State website:

There are 2 pages on the state website that are password protected due to privacy concerns (publishing names, phone numbers, address and email addresses). The password for the directory - committees and council minutes is MD27serves. Feel free to disseminate this password to all Lions. The password is meant to prevent public browsers from viewing those pages.

(Tom had, just the night before, received a President's Award for his work as the B1 website administrator from International Director Lee Vrieze).

LCIF Coordinator PDG B.J. Blahnik

DG Lion Greg has been offering the Individual Donor form for LCIF and currently has roughly 60 individuals who have donated to LCIF. DG Lion Greg will continue to bring this with him to his club visits.

Pediatric Cancer Chair PDG Dave Lee

(This report is patterned closely to the report for the Sept 30 Council of Governors meeting)

The Wisconsin Lions Childhood Cancer Fund Initiative was launched in mid-August following the approval by the Council of Governors in early August. Emails were sent to all Wisconsin Lions from the State Office announcing the Fund Initiative and providing details. Also, an article with a similar message appeared in the latest edition of the Wisconsin Lion.

- There have been a number a questions received from various Lions and these have been responded to in a timely fashion.
- The district childhood cancer chairs had a Zoom communication meeting recently and we plan to meet monthly for the foreseeable future.
- The contributions to date are encouraging. I will plan to provide specifics briefly at the upcoming cabinet meeting.
- We are meeting with representatives of potential childhood cancer support organizations to learn more about them and are working toward developing a group to recommend to the COG that would cover every county in Wisconsin for potential support to families of need dealing with childhood cancer.
- On the Zoom call we also discussed February 15th being International Childhood Cancer Awareness Day and welcomed ideas for giving Wisconsin Lions a chance to visibly show they care for kids and families dealing with childhood cancer. We welcome ideas from anyone.
- I am interested in having speaking time at district conventions along with the district childhood cancer chairs for brief encouraging messaging.

Restoring Hope Transplant House Chair Barb Leichtfuss

Director Cindy Herbst reports a very busy year at RHTH. This August they cared for 63 more people than the previous August in 2022. For a variety of reasons, people have been more affected by depression related to not only their illnesses, but also the economic impact it is having on their lives. She has also noticed that their coping skills are less. They are not going to their doctors as often as they should due to co-pays, etc.

She also mentioned that surprisingly, many Lions she is in contact with don't feel they have a "personal" connection with RHTH, which affects their attitudes towards supporting RHTH. They are unaware of people in their immediate areas that have been or are being treated there. They are always surprised when the statistics are shared with them.

That being said, she is asking that Lions Clubs please put together information about local support options in their communities that are available for when patients and their families return home. They are in need of any help available to ease their worries and pinched budgets.

Examples are: Local food pantries, dialysis centers, free household help such as shoveling snow, cleaning, etc., resale stores for clothing and other household goods. What are local churches able to help with? She will then share the appropriate information with them.

GUATEMALA

The first mission will be to Guatemala and that is a combination of Wisconsin and Minnesota Lions. We have been working with Minnesota Lions for the past 3-4 years helping them get a mission program up and

running. This mission is being co-chaired by Gary Donaldson from Wisconsin and Dan Goetz from Minnesota and half the workers from each state. We will be working with/training the MN Lions so that next year they can assume a larger role and perhaps move forward on their own after that. This is a great way to increase Lions service to people in need! The dates of this mission are Feb. 3-10-2024.

DOMICICAN REPUBLIC

The second mission will be back to the Dominican Republic 2/28-3/7-2024. Tom Bredesen will lead this mission. Last year was our first time in DR and under Tom's leadership it was a very successful and enjoyable mission. There is room for (and need for) 5-7 more people on this trip.

WLM has decided that all people going on their first mission should have gone through a basic training program before they go and it is our responsibility to make that training available. Though we don't have details for such a training program worked out yet we will be doing one in November or December this year and we expect all new people, and experienced ones as well if they wish, to participate.

OTHER THINGS!

During the past several months WLM has taken two trailer loads of household items to the flood victims of eastern Kentucky. This was done in cooperation with the local Lions in those cities. We also have made two trips to the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation in South Dakota with furniture and more for the people there. We took the Lions trailer to Omaha, NE, to Ames, IA and to Olewein, IA to pick up used eyeglasses from those states. These glasses were brought back to our recycling center as a way of supporting that important Lions program. How many glasses did we pick up is not known exactly, but a 34 foot long trailer piled 3+ feet deep with glasses is a lot of glasses

Pine Ridge South Dakota Reservation

There is another eyeglass mission trip planned in the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation for October 2024. We tried to put something together for this year, but after some communication delays didn't allow us to put something together that soon, it was decided to wait until next year to get all the details ironed out.

As we begin 2024, new ideas, new projects and new ways to better serve our communities. With that thought I would like to propose a new, combined and I feel long needed project. As many of you are aware of there is a new Medical Equipment Locker in Appleton and of course the long-time running Larson/Winchester Medical Equipment Locker.

I have spoken to the Larson/Winchester Club several times; they agree the new Medical Locker in Appleton is a great addition but agree it doesn't help all the communities on the south end. I've spoken to them several times and suggested a Medical Equipment Locker down on the south end of Lake Winnebago. They are delighted with the idea and would be willing to provide technical assistance as well as plenty of Medical Equipment.

So, with all this in mind, I would like to propose the District 27B1 South End Medical Equipment Locker. A multi club project that would serve multi communities and of course would make all clubs involved more visible to our communities.

The proposal would include a 24ft x 60ft building constructed on the Van Dyne Lions Club property, eliminating having to purchase land. Here's a brief update on our efforts for the Wisconsin Lions Childhood Cancer Fund initiative

- 1. We have established or revitalized monthly communications among the childhood cancer district chairs (i.e. A1, A2, ...) via group zoom
- 2. Proposed established support groups have been identified for the Fund initiative and discussions have been had with representatives of these groups. Various district childhood cancer chairs have participated.

 3. Summaries of each of the prospective support groups were shared/discussed with the district childhood cancer chairs on our December
- 200m call the group expressed a vote of confidence for supporting this approach and proposal.

 4. This past fall, we had speaking time at the C2 and B1 conventions, but unable to get an opportunity at the B2 convention (the Council Chair included messaging in his remarks). Working on speaking slots for 2024 conventions. Lion Terry Tveita, A1 district childhood cancer chair, will be speaking at the A1 convention on January 6th.
- 5. As of early December the fund donations approached \$26,000 with more than 100 of MD27 clubs already donating. The goal is to have 100% participation by the 505 Wisconsin clubs. An update will be given at/before the January COG meeting. There is an effort to look at making online donations possible for the Wis Lions Childhood Cancer Fund, subject to the approval of the
- COG. A status update may be provided at the COG January weekend.

 7. More than 250 LCI childhood cancer pins (private funds) have been purchased for encouraging individual Lions donors to make a
- onation of \$50 or more to get a pin in recognition. We will procure another 250 pins for donors if necessary. Obviously then, the goal is to get 250 to 500 individual Lions donors supporting the Wisconsin Lions Childhood Cancer Fund.

 8. Given the current status for donations with 80% of the clubs awaiting to make a donation, along with the individual donor effort, it is feasible to foresee a possible accrual of \$100,000 during 2023-2024, but this will not occur without an ongoing collective effort among the
- current district governors, their vice district governors, the childhood cancer district chairs, all zone chairs, club officers, and state Lions members!! Each club helping a little so that together we can help a lot!!
- 9. A draft of the proposal which is supported by the district childhood cancer chairs has been provided to the Council Chair. This will be a topic for discussion and approval at the January COG meetings.

To date, 24% of the MD 27 clubs have contributed to the project, to a total of \$34,000.

Appleton Evening, Appleton Noon, Butte des Morts, Larsen-Winchester and Neenah clubs, DG Greg Kubichka, MD27 GMT Chair IPDG Bert Freeman and PDG Dave Lee, MD27 Childhood Cancer Chair.

Lion John Franger, Fox Valley Medical Loan Locker Board President gave an update on the locker. So far it has been a great success with nearly 200 visitors each month and 2000 items lent out since opening in August. St Paul Home donated 15 hospital beds. New volunteers have become Lions and youth volunteers have been recruited from area high schools. They are looking into the possibility of Leo Clubs. One volunteer works on finding appropriate placement of donated items that cannot be used by the locker. Father Carr's in Oshkosh and area veterinaries have taken many items. Thank you to Larsen-Winchester for their guidance and to Valley Packaging for storing the overflow. DG Greg reported that the COG is contemplating support for the medical locker concept.

PDG Dave Lee gave an update on the Childhood Cancer initiative. The early response has been positive and donations have come in from clubs and individuals. They are in the process of meeting with organizations around the state that provide help for families of need dealing with childhood cancer to determine support needs and opportunities.

Membership challenges and successes

Guest speaker MD27 GMT Chair Bert Freeman talked about STOP THE DROP, the importance of member retention. Review your club roster for those members who are absent or behind in dues. Reach out to them, not just by text or email but by phone or even in person, multiple times if necessary. Show them you care and let them know they are valued. Consider a plan of action to support long term members and keep them on the roster as they age. He also talked about finding out why members choose to leave. Many times the reasons can be remedied. Bert handed out M&Ms to emphasize that Membership Matters.

DG Greg talked about honoring service projects over meetings. Work with other organizations on larger service projects. He spoke of a very successful Christmas lights project in Chilton that besides Lions involves many other area service organizations and groups. He also handed out Lions literature on Membership and New Member Orientation. Both DG Greg and GMT Chair talked about the 1.5 Million Member Challenge to reach 1.5 members worldwide by 2027. The current membership is 1.4 million.

Update note for B1 March cabinet meeting:

At the March state council of governors meeting the governors approved a disbursement at the state convention of an even split (20% each) to the five previously approved childhood cancer support groups that cover Wisconsin – this will be done at the state Lions convention in Madison in mid-May. At the end of the Lions fiscal year (June 30th), the funds that have accumulated since the state convention will be disbursed evenly to these five support groups. They are the Childrens Cancer Family Foundation of NE Wisconsin, Cory's Project, Kisses from Keegan and Friends, the Badger Childhood Cancer Network, and the Krause Family Pediatric Cancer Angel

The process will be undertaken to pursue the continuance of the Wisconsin Lions Childhood Cancer Fund initiative for the upcoming year, subject to the approval of the council of governors.

My report to the council of governors for their March meeting is included below.

February 15th, 2024

International Childhood Cancer Day

<u>Action Item for Council of Governors at the March meeting</u>: Discuss, propose, and approve an allocation percentage for disbursements of raised funds to the five support groups (previously approved by the COG for the Wisconsin Lions Childhood Cancer Fund initiative) to be presented at the upcoming MD27 State Convention.

Report to Council of Governors from MD27 state childhood cancer chair Lion Dave Lee

(this closely follows a recent email communication to the ten MD27 district childhood cancer chairs)

Happy to be able to say that we are making steady progress, but you could say that we have a long way to go and a short time to get there, since we may be presenting disbursements to the five support groups at the State Convention in May.

Our goal is for 100% of the 505 Wisconsin clubs to make a donation of some amount to this initiative, so that we can say that all 505 Wisconsin clubs are helping families of need in Wisconsin who are dealing with childhood cancer.

Thank you for all the enthusiasm and awareness building from our District Childhood Cancer Chairs and from our District Governors, and Vice DGs!!! Thank you to JoAnn Burk at the state office and to Council Chair BJ for the help and support that you both have provided.

Some observations from the separately attached table that represents donations as of February 8th:

- We have surpassed total donations of \$35,000 with 133 of our 505 clubs making a donation (or several donations)! That's 26 percent of the clubs at this time. That puts us in the 2nd quarter for the percentage of Wisconsin clubs donating up to now.
- A1 is definitely leading the pack with 26 clubs out of 51 clubs making a donation. That's 51% at this point. They have definitely set the pace.
- Appleton Noon in B1 has had more individual member donations than any other club so far with 10 members donating out of 53 members. We have a free Childhood Cancer pin for all individuals donating \$50 or more.
- District A1 is in the upper half for clubs donating, or we could call it the 3rd quarter.
- Districts B1, C2, and D1 are in the 2nd quarter with 25 to 50% of their clubs donating.
- Districts A2, B2, D2, E1, and E2 are in the 1st quarter with up to 25% of their clubs donating so far.
- This is definitely not a race among Districts, but, as your District leaders, you probably are interested in knowing where your District currently stands relative to the others. Hoping that all ten districts can achieve 100% of their clubs donating!

We have found that clubs being aware of this fund initiative is the biggest factor for donations being made. Please encourage your clubs to make a donation. Clubs donating \$100 or more will receive a banner patch at year end. Individual Lions donations are also appreciated – those making donations of \$50 or more will receive an LCI childhood cancer global focus pin.

Please congratulate those clubs in your district that have made donations and encourage the others to make a donation. While we are asking for \$100 or more from each club, we respect that our clubs have differing coffers for how much they can donate.

We appreciate whatever clubs can donate. We have seen a few donations of \$25 or \$50 and we have seen donations over \$1,000. We are averaging about \$250 per club for donations at this time. The majority of the club donations have been for \$100.

As we have said before, our focus is encouraging all 505 Wisconsin clubs to make a donation. It would be great to receive donations by the end of April so that they can be included in the disbursements to the five support groups at the State Convention in May.

February 15 is International Childhood Cancer Day. The average family dealing with childhood cancer loses 40% of their family income as one of the spouses often has to quit their job.

Childhood Cancer is one of the Lions eight global causes – and two other related global causes are Humanitarian Causes and Youth.

Recently we received an email from a Council Chair elect in South Carolina, who is excited about our Childhood Cancer initiative and interested in launching something similar in her state.

It is a good thing that Wisconsin Lions are doing to help families of need who are dealing with Childhood Cancer.

Roxanne's District Convention in 2025 will be the District's 50th Anniversary Convention. It will be held in Oshkosh and she is planning a special celebration and is hoping to see a great turnout.

B1 GLT PDG Tom Wendt spoke of upcoming elections and the opportunity for newly elected club officers to attend training sessions provided by the district. The sessions will be held as workshops and will have valuable information for all members not just club officers. Planning is underway to hold the workshops in St. Nazianz and Ripon again.

PDG Tom also spoke of the plans that are underway for Van Dyne Lions along with 10 other clubs from the southern end of the district to develop a medical loan locker. 

Sheboygan Area Eye Bank Committee Disbands

After 48 years, the Sheboygan Area Lions Eye Bank Committee is disbanding. Formed in 1975 as a joint effort of the Sheboygan Noon and Sheboygan Evening Lions Clubs to serve as an eye bank station to collect eve tissue for corneal transplants. The clubs worked with a Sheboygan ophthalmologist and Memorial and St. Nicholas Hospitals. At that time, branch eye banks were established/approved around the State by Lions Clubs to provide surgeons with healthy tissue for corneal transplants and grafting. The local clubs had to purchase surgical equipment and special containers to be used in transporting the tissue, which transportation was done by Lions clubs. Prior to the current single Bank of Wisconsin office in Madison, central offices were located at the Medical College of Wisconsin in Milwaukee and at University Hospital in Madison. Lions were also responsible for publicizing the program and informing the public about eye tissue donation. They also raised funds to support the program and reimburse transporters for their expenses. Each area club interested in the project was encouraged to designate one or two members for the committee.

Clubs continue to support the Eye Bank with contributions and many clubs provide transporters, however dissemination of information, coordination of transporters, and updating of procedures are now handled by the Eye Bank and Wisconsin Lions Foundation. With the advent of email, texting, and websites, the need for a formalized committee was reduced. In Sheboygan County, the number of transports significantly decreased over the years because the staff hired for enucleation comes from outside of our area and they often take the tissue along with them rather than sending it with transporters.

They invited Heather and Kymani to their meeting in July and learned firsthand how his life and future might be improved by the Or Cam My Eye Pro. This revolutionary assistive technology has the power to transform his world and open up countless opportunities for learning, independence, and personal growth.

The Or Cam My Eye Pro is a remarkable device that harnesses the power of artificial intelligence to provide real-time visual and auditory information to individuals with visual impairments. It attaches discreetly to eyeglasses, acting



By utilizing this cutting-edge technology, a student will be able to access printed materials, navigate his surroundings confidently, and engage more effectively in various learning activities.

They were very excited about helping to secure the purchase of this device for Kymani. Their member, Lion Chad Lisowe, offered to visit the clubs in Zone 7 to inform them and ask for their help, with the goal of funding the entire \$4800 cost in time for the start of the school year.
